

PROGRESS: ARE STUDENTS MAKING SUFFICIENT PROGRESS?

Using research-based best practices, students are supported through a comprehensive program that addresses students' academic, emotional, and behavioral needs. Through ongoing job-embedded professional development, teachers share innovative instructional strategies, analyze student performance data, and collaborate to improve results. Success for All's reading, math, and language programs were implemented at Maria A. Ulloa Elementary School to support students' development in literacy and math. In addition, daily lessons in other content areas are specially designed to support school-wide achievement plans. Reading, math, language, and behavior data are regularly reviewed. Students not meeting the mastery criteria are intentionally targeted for appropriate interventions. Achievement gains are documented and celebrated.

ENVIRONMENT: IS THE SCHOOL ENVIRONMENT SUPPORTING STUDENTS, TEACHERS, and FAMILIES?

- Success for All The Success for All Program was in its third year of adoption at MAUES. Refinements continue to take place in order to strengthen the quality of teaching and learning. Reading achievement improved by 7.58%, whereas 5% improvement is the expected level of achievement among SFA schools nationally. Other SFA components such as PowerTeaching Math, Writing Wings, and Tutoring continued to be implemented.
- Solutions Network In addition to the academic components, comprehensive schoolwide support systems were implemented. Faculty and staff formed teams to improve outcomes in student attendance, student behavior, early interventions, parent and family involvement, and community support. Conflict resolution was also taught through the Getting-Along-Together Curriculum.
- Professional Learning Communities Teachers started meeting by reading component in order systematically review reading achievement
 data and plan for improving results. Data was analyzed periodically. Student performance was continuously monitored. Best practices were
 shared and implemented.


OUTCOMES: WHAT STUDENTS ARE ACCOMPLISHING?


- Books and Breakfast Kindergarten teacher's organized quarterly Saturday workshops to help parents support their child's literacy development in the home.

- 4th Place Math Olympiad During the island-wide Math Olympiad Competition, MAUES ranked 4th among public schools.




Performance Levels


